Valrie Campbell

Jamaica

Valrie Campbell, General Manager of Group Operations at Kingston Wharves Limited (KWL), is a prominent figure in Jamaica's port industry. Her appointment in 2016 made her the first woman to lead operations at a terminal in Jamaica and the first in KWL's 74-year history. Her career reflects a remarkable ascent, starting as a receptionist and telephone operator at the terminal, later obtaining bachelor's and master's degrees, and various specializations, demonstrating her ability to break the glass ceiling and overcome gender barriers in a male-dominated field.

Responsible for the daily management of the Kingston Wharves terminal, her leadership extends to overseeing operational policies and procedures, ensuring efficiency and safety in all activities. Under her direction, she oversaw a key business segment responsible for over 70% of the organization's revenue and profits, leading to a terminal revenue growth of over 30% and profit increase of over 400%.

My focus at this time is giving back and helping to hone and unlock the potential of other talented individuals in the industry, including women. - Valrie Campbell





Furthermore, her active participation in organizations such as Women in Maritime Association Caribbean (WiMAC) and Women's International Shipping & Trading Association (WISTA) Jamaica, and her commitment to the professional development of women in the sector through her role as an active mentor, positions her as a key advocate for gender diversity and inclusion in the maritime sector. Her work in this area can be seen in KWL's noticeable shift towards hiring more women in non-traditional roles, with now 50% of junior managers being women, compared to no representation less than a decade ago.

It is also worth highlighting Campbell's social responsibility, as she promotes sustainable practices and the development of public-private partnerships to address environmental and socio-economic challenges in the community. Likewise, her involvement in volunteering activities and membership in community organizations underscore her commitment to the overall welfare of society.

Valrie Campbell's work in the port industry has been recognized by both peers and external organizations, making her the recipient of the 2019 WiMAC Award for being the first female Terminal Manager in Jamaica. In summary, Valrie has significantly contributed to KWL's competitiveness through her innovative leadership, commitment to sustainability and social responsibility, and advocacy for gender equality in the workplace. Her exemplary career and dedication to breaking gender barriers make her a visionary leader and a driving force for change in her industry and community.
